How did you become interested in the organ?

I grew up in a church with a nine-rank pipe organ. As a youngster taking piano lessons, I found the organ irresistible. I credit the hospitality of my organist and minister of music as much as I do my own interest for getting me hooked. Hospitality is critical.

What is your educational and professional background? I went to high school at the North Carolina School of the Arts, where my teachers were Marian Hahn and Robert McDonald, piano, and John Mueller, organ. I earned my BMus in piano and organ performance at Appalachian State University in 1990, studying organ with H. Max Smith and piano with Rodney Reynerson and Allen Kindt. I then earned masters and DMA degrees from Rice University in 1997 and 2002 respectively, studying with Clyde Holloway.

Since 2004, I have served on the faculty of the Hayes School of Music, Appalachian State University, in Boone, NC, where I teach organ and church music studies.

What are the organ's greatest joys and challenges for you?

I am challenged most often by the tension between my work ethic in the practice room and my available time to practice!

But no matter what, the organ is a faithful mainstay of my daily productivity. And when I am seated at an organ that already serves its listeners well, then it's a great day.

Why are you an AGO member?

I joined the AGO because my teacher wisely made me aware of the AGO. But I was always lured by The American Organist, anyway. I felt that all those names and faces in the magazine were names and faces of greatness. I wanted to meet them all; I wanted to be one of them; I wanted to network with them and visit their corners of the world.

And I loved the color photos of the beautiful instruments and wanted to visit them. *Continued on Page 4*

Please share with us an interesting moment you had on the organ bench.





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SAINT DOMINIC CATHOLIC CHURCH WASHINGTON, DC

"The Island", as it was often called in the nineteenth century, consisted of the area now known as Southwest Washington. Members of the Order of Preachers – the Dominicans – have stood witness in this historic part of the District of Columbia for over 160 years. The present structure, designed by noted New York City-based architect Patrick Keely, was completed in 1875. Just a decade later, in 1885, a fire destroyed the church's interior, which was quickly restored. At the same time, the church was adorned with a grand new organ.



We at Di Gennaro-Hart are pleased to announce that we have been commissioned by the Archdiocese of Washington to undertake a major restoration of the Hilborne L. Roosevelt instrument. Cousins to Teddy, Hilborne and his

brother, Frank Roosevelt, were among the very finest nineteenth century American organ builders.


The project will include the replacement of the 1929 Englishstyle console with an "American terraced" console built according to current AGO standards. The console will offer a strong nod to the Roosevelts, particularly through the use of the engraving font that was commissioned by their firm. The present solid state control systems will be replaced with a 100 channel capture system and a new switching system with performance recorder. The reeds will be restored, numerous repairs will be completed, and the entire instrument will be thoroughly cleaned. A powerful Tuba stop, constructed by a shop that traces its roots to the Roosevelt firm, will be added.
