

#### MEMBER SPOTLIGHT ON LAURA HENDERSON

How did you become interested in the organ?

I grew up making music in church -- singing, flute, handbells -- and took piano lessons in my teenage years. In college, I needed a way to fulfill a performing arts requirement but wasn't particularly interested in continuing any of my previous musical studies.



Several folks who had heard me play in church encouraged me to take organ lessons, just to see if I enjoyed it. I was hooked from the first lesson!

What is your educational and professional background?

I have a BA in French and music from The College of William and Mary and an MA from Georgetown University in music, culture and religion. Both of my theses focused on the French organ tradition -- my undergraduate thesis studied the cultural history of pipe

organs in Paris during the Enlightenment, and my graduate thesis examined Alexandre Guilmant's approach to organ pedagogy and practice. Professionally, I spent 12 years at Georgetown University, first in fundraising, then as a postgraduate fellowships adviser, and finally as the assistant director of music and programs in Catholic ministry. I'm currently raising my two young children and working as a substitute organist.

What are the organ's biggest challenges and joys for you?

My biggest challenge by far is finding a time and place to practice regularly. I'm so jealous of musicians who can own and easily transport their own instruments! For now, I have my piano and a few generous churches where I can practice when our schedules match, which I'm so thankful for. My biggest joy is the role the organ can play in meaningful moments in a person's life. By supporting a congregation in song, holding prayerful space during a funeral, or announcing a newly married couple, the organ helps to create memories and build communities. It can enhance times that connect us to our neighbors and our values. Of course, any musical instrument can do this, but in my (admittedly biased) opinion the organ does this best, and I find great joy in bringing this intent to my work as an organist.

#### Why are you an AGO member?

The AGO has been a great way for me to grow as an organist, and to be connected to other organists in the DC area. I enjoy getting the monthly encouragement (in the form of TAO) to sit down and read about this craft, and was glad to have the extra push to practice during COVID by sitting for the Service-Playing Exam. I'm studying for the CAGO this fall -- if anyone's interested in taking the CAGO and is looking for an *Continued on Page 4*

What do you like to do when you are not on the organ bench?

I enjoy taking walks with my family on the nature trail close to our house and finding ways to maximize our very small living space (we're not in an official Tiny House, but it's close). I volunteer as a mentor to Georgetown students applying for the Fulbright U.S. Student Program. I also enjoy traveling; our family schedule is very flexible right now, which gives us the opportunity to travel easily during the week. Our favorite places to go as a family are Williamsburg, VA, and my dad's house in Roanoke, VA.

What else would you like members to know about you?

I don't have a regular Sunday engagement, so if you are in need, please reach out! This isn't intended as an ad -- I just know it's tough to find a sub, and I want you to be able to take a break when you need it.

I've also started an Instagram account (@thesubstituteorganist) with the intent of demystifying the role of a substitute organist and encouraging others (especially young organists

who choose not to have full-time music jobs) to consider subbing once in a while.

What is your most memorable moment on the organ bench?

During my first Lessons and Carols at Georgetown, I looked down from the organ loft and saw that my father, boyfriend (now my husband) and boyfriend's parents were all sitting together. My dad and future in-laws hadn't met before that evening. I knew that they were all going to be in attendance but had imagined that I would introduce them after the service. I remember turning to my colleague and saying, "Well, I hope that is going well!" It was, and our parents are now very close. I still smile remembering that.



#### KRAYBILL TO PLAY SECOND IN SCHREIBER RECITAL SERIES

The First Baptist Church of Washington will present a concert by Grammy-nominated organist Jan Kraybill at 4 p.m. Sunday, Nov. 12, in the church sanctuary at 1328 16th St. NW. The recital is the second in a series celebrating the legacy and 90th birthday of longtime D.C. organist Lawrence P. "Lon" Schreiber.

At First Baptist, Dr. Schreiber oversaw the installation of an organ custom-built by the Austin Organ Company of Hartford, CT. The organ contains more than 6,000 pipes and trumpets in four chambers. The console features 229 stops and five manuals.

Kraybill is based in Kansas City. She has been a featured artist and presenter at regional and national conventions of the American Guild of Organists, the Hymn Society in the U.S. and Canada, the American Choral Directors Association and other groups.



The Nov. 12 program includes Intermezzo from Symphony No. 6 for Organ by Charles-Marie Widor; Prelude and Fugue in G Major by Johann Sebastian Bach; Chaconne from First Suite for Military Band, Op. 28, No. 1 by Gustav Holst; Finlandia by Jean Sibelius; Cantabile from Organ Symphony No. 1 in B minor by Elfrida Andreé; King of Kings by Ralph Simpson; and Prelude and Fugue in B Major, Op. 7, No. 1 by Marcel Dupré.

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

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## SAINT DOMINIC CATHOLIC CHURCH WASHINGTON, DC

"The Island", as it was often called in the nineteenth century, consisted of the area now known as Southwest Washington. Members of the Order of Preachers — the Dominicans — have stood witness in this historic part of the District of Columbia for over 160 years. The present structure, designed by noted New York City-based architect Patrick Keely, was completed in 1875. Just a decade later, in 1885, a fire destroyed the church's interior, which was quickly restored. At the same time, the church was adorned with a grand new organ.



We at Di Gennaro-Hart are pleased to announce that we have been commissioned by the Archdiocese of Washington to undertake a major restoration of the Hilborne L. Roosevelt instrument. Cousins to Teddy, Hilborne and his

brother, Frank Roosevelt, were among the very finest nineteenth century American organ builders.

The project will include the replacement of the 1929 English-style console with an "American terraced" console built according to current AGO standards. The console will offer a strong nod to the Roosevelts, particularly through the use of the engraving font that was commissioned by their firm. The present solid state control systems will be replaced with a 100 channel capture system and a new switching system with performance recorder. The reeds will be restored, numerous repairs will be completed, and the entire instrument will be thoroughly cleaned. A powerful Tuba stop, constructed by a shop that traces its roots to the Roosevelt firm, will be added.
