Spotlight on Black History

Dear DC AGO members,

Happy February!

Did you know that the Smithsonian's National Museum of American History includes a pair of organ shoes?

They belonged to organist and educator Althea Thomas, a native of Montgomery, AL, and were worn while she served as organist for Martin Luther King Jr.'s congregation at Dexter Avenue Baptist Church in Montgomery.

Thomas earned degrees from Alabama State University in both music and art. Many of the people in the higher positions at Dexter Avenue were



connected to Alabama state, including the university's vice president, who served as the choral director. He knew Thomas well and recommended *Continued on Page 4*

How did you become interested in the organ?

My mother used to play for church before she got married. She minored in voice and piano at the University of Kentucky and we actually had a Lowry spinet with the matchstick pedals in our home. When I was 9 years old, my mother began trying to teach me to read music. I still remember her remarking "You don't know your bass clef..."

Then in 1975 my father took me to see/hear Virgil Fox at Wolf Trap. Apparently I came home and told my mom, "I want to do that." I don't remember saying that and I never got the cape or "lasers"...

What is your educational and professional background?

Typical of a lot of you, I began playing organ in church at the age of 12. My mother found a great teacher in Dana Brown at Westminster Presbyterian in Alexandria. The summer before my 16th birthday I had subbed at many of the Baptist churches in Alexandria and was invited to play at Groveton Baptist Church for the last two years of high school. I had a terrifically inspiring choir director (a lieutenant colonel in the Army) and he challenged me to learn many accompaniments. My sight reading improved Continued on Page 3

by accompanying all the choirs. He was always giving me collections to use for preludes and postludes.

I got a small scholarship to attend James Madison University to study with Dr. Richard McPherson. He was a student at the University of Michigan and the Mason and Glasgow studios so that is my

lineage. I was incredibly fortunate to have him as a teacher and not have to go to school hours away. It was there that I took a year of piano lessons. I used the money I had saved to get my master's degree at The Catholic University and studied with Wojciech Wojtasiewicz.

I remained interested in the trio sonatas of Bach and eventually learned and performed all six. Of course I'm still learning them!

What are the organ's biggest challenges and joys for you? My biggest joys are accompanying congregational singing and working out registrations for accompaniments for choir anthems. Biggest (sometime) challenges are shepherding/ministering to the choir flock and being present for congregation members at exhausting times. There are a lot of moving parts to what we do. As a colleague put it, "it's a large basket of skills." Certainly self-care is important. See biking story below...

Why are you an AGO member?

The Guild encourages our profession in performance and church music ministry, and is a resource for all levels of study.

What do you like to do when you are not on the bench?

Ride my titanium road bike 70-100 miles a week. Don't get me started on that topic! It is my meditation, and I could talk your ear off about it. I'm quite lucky that I can incorporate commuting to Chevy Chase Circle through the park during the week.

What's an interesting fact you would like people to know about you? I'm a thrift shop junkie.

Tell us a funny/odd thing that happened when you were on an organ bench. A custodian actually asked my permission to run the vacuum cleaner.

her to Dr. King when he was looking for an organist. She served with King from June 1955 until his departure for Atlanta in December 1959. Her performances of gospel anthems such as "Precious

Lord, Take My Hand" while wearing these shoes inspired King and his congregation every Sunday during the landmark Montgomery bus boycott.

The shoes themselves were black tap shoes, made by the Bloch Company. According to the Smithsonian website, Thomas removed the metal taps on the bottoms of the shoes to use them as organ shoes. She eventually donated them to the museum.

Dexter Avenue Baptist Church, later renamed Dexter Avenue King Memorial Baptist Church in MLK's honor, was his first and only pastorate. Althea Thomas served faithfully as organist for more than 60 years.

Next time you visit the National Museum of American History, be sure to stop by this unique exhibit!

Charles Reardon, a 17-year-old organist from Northern Virginia who was spotlighted in the July 2023 issue of The Coupler, has been given the opportunity to tour through Europe this summer, performing in a wind ensemble made of select high school musicians from the East Coast. To help fund the trip, he has created a fundraiser organ concert series with four others also aiming to tour. The organ is the foundation of the ensemble, which includes a trumpeter, oboist, percussionist and cellist/flautist. The program features 10 pieces (most of which Charles arranged for his unique ensemble), including an Irish jig, Baroque quartet music, Gershwin, Sousa, and finishing off with mighty Widor.



It is with great pleasure that we invite you to the second concert in our 2024 Concert Series, a special appearance by renowned Concert Organist, **Benjamin J. LaPrairie**.

From our collection of over 100 pipe organs digitally recorded for our *Hauptwerk* virtual pipe organ, Mr. LaPrairie has chose three magnificent historical instruments for you to enjoy. The Tobias-Heinrich-Gottfried-Trost organ in the Stadtkirche of Waltershausen, Germany, was built in 1730. It is an ideal instrument for the performance of Bach and his contemporaries. The William A. Johnson & Son organ of 1877 is one of the finest American Romantic organs in this country. Finally, the 1855 organ by the famous French builder, Aristide Cavaillé-Coll, in the Cathedral of St. Omer, France, is a masterpiece of the French symphonic style of organ building.

This concert will include spoken commentary providing a rare opportunity to learn about and experience three superb pipe organs representing different traditions of organ design.

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
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
