Hidden Figures

As we embark on the celebration of Women's History Month, I want to highlight a few of the African American women who composed music for the organ.


For a variety of historical reasons, much of this music has until recently remained only in manuscript form. Recent efforts to create anthologies of this music by scholars such as Mickey Thomas Terry, James Abbington and others have helped to address this issue and draw attention to organ music produced by a sorely neglected, but substantive school of American composers whose recognition is long overdue. That list includes Florence B. Price, Undine Smith Moore, Zenobia Powell Perry, Betty Jackson King, Sharon J. Willis and Eurydice V. Osterman, to name a handful.

Given that we often hear of Florence Price, I will *Continued on Page 8*

How did you become interested in the organ?

I grew up in a church where my parents led the Folk Mass music so hearing organ was a special event for me and always something that I looked forward to at special holiday masses.

I also became fascinated with all things mechanical as a child and the organ was the perfect combination of my love for music and my love for machines.



What is your educational and professional background?

I began taking private organ lessons when I was 15. I hadn't studied piano prior and could hardly read music so I have the highest appreciation for my first teacher's skill and patience with me.

I soon began subbing at local churches and went on to study organ during my undergraduate years with Gail Archer at Vassar College. I also hold a master of music degree in organ performance and composition from Boston University, where I studied with Peter Sykes.

I am currently serving as music director at Immanuel Presbyterian Church in McLean (left) and previously held positions at St. John's Lutheran and First Congregational in Poughkeepsie, NY, and St. Dunstan's Episcopal Church in Dover, MA. I also hold a CAGO certification.

What are the organ's biggest challenges and joys for you?

The biggest joy for me is leading a large singing congregation in a great hymn. The energy for all those voices fills me with such joy and hope! The biggest challenge is the weekly grind of finding exciting, musically interesting postludes that are relatively short.



focus for a moment on one of the potentially lesser-known names listed above.

Renowned as "The Dean of Black Women Composers," Undine Smith Moore (1904-1989) graduated



from Fisk University in 1926 with highest honors and received a master of music degree at Columbia University. She pursued additional study at the Juilliard School, the Eastman School and the Manhattan School of Music, and taught music for 45 years at Virginia State College (now Virginia State University).

Primarily known for her choral compositions, Moore published with regularity during the 1940s-60s, writing also for organ, piano, voice, flute and chamber ensemble. Moore stated that, "I will say, if forced, that I use the term black music to describe music created 'mainly' by people who call themselves black, and whose compositions in their large or complete body show a frequent, if not preponderant, use of significant elements derived from the Afro-American heritage."

As did other composers of this era, Moore incorporated standard, classical style in her music, as in her two solo organ works, *Variations on Nettleton*, commissioned in 1976 for the graduation recital of a Virginia State University music student, and *Variations on There Is a Fountain*, written in the style of Mendelssohn's Sixth Sonata for Organ.

Variations on Nettleton is a short piece in the key of C major. It begins with a variation based on the tune. The melodic line in the first variation is in the soprano voice and is accompanied by triplets in the left hand. A brief interlude follows, and the second and last variations present the melody in the pedal voice. The brief interlude consists of chromaticism on the manuals followed by a forte pedal entrance, which gradually diminishes to a piano with large leaps in the manuals and pedals. The last four measures—Allargando e maestoso—are chromatic and the piece ends with four distinct chromatic jazz chords.

Of course, much more can be said of Moore, and of Zenobia Powell Perry (1908-2004), a black Creek Indian woman who studied piano with black pianist-composer R. Nathaniel Dett and composition with Darius Milhaud, and of Betty Jackson King (1928-1994), who studied at the Peabody Conservatory and Westminster Choir College and who wrote works for piano, organ and voice, as well as art songs and choral works.

There are also contemporary composers such as Sharon J. Willis (b. 1949), the former department *Continued on Page 9*

chair of music at Morris Brown College and Clark Atlanta University, who had a commissioned piece premiere at the 2022 National AGO Convention ("Ascension Suite"), as well as local composer Evelyn Simpson-Curenton (b. 1953).

I encourage you to continue to explore the works of these wonderful black female composers, both past and present. These anthologies compiled by James Abbington and Mickey Thomas Terry are excellent starting points:





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SAINT DOMINIC CATHOLIC CHURCH WASHINGTON, DC

"The Island", as it was often called in the nineteenth century, consisted of the area now known as Southwest Washington. Members of the Order of Preachers — the Dominicans — have stood witness in this historic part of the District of Columbia for over 160 years. The present structure, designed by noted New York City-based architect Patrick Keely, was completed in 1875. Just a decade later, in 1885, a fire destroyed the church's interior, which was quickly restored. At the same time, the church was adorned with a grand new organ.



We at Di Gennaro-Hart are pleased to announce that we have been commissioned by the Archdiocese of Washington to undertake a major restoration of the Hilborne L. Roosevelt instrument. Cousins to Teddy, Hilborne and his

brother, Frank Roosevelt, were among the very finest nineteenth century American organ builders.

The project will include the replacement of the 1929 English-style console with an "American terraced" console built according to current AGO standards. The console will offer a strong nod to the Roosevelts, particularly through the use of the engraving font that was commissioned by their firm. The present solid state control systems will be replaced with a 100 channel capture system and a new switching system with performance recorder. The reeds will be restored, numerous repairs will be completed, and the entire instrument will be thoroughly cleaned. A powerful Tuba stop, constructed by a shop that traces its roots to the Roosevelt firm, will be added.
