Celebrate Juneteenth with music

Dear DC AGO members,

We will conclude our chapter's 2022-23 season with our second annual Juneteenth Festival, to be held on Monday, June 19th at the Franciscan Monastery of the Holy Land in America, 1400 Quincy St. NE.

Juneteenth marks our country's second independence day. Although it has long been celebrated in the African American community, this monumental event remains largely unknown to most Americans.

Even though the Emancipation Proclamation went into effect Jan. 1, 1863, it could not be implemented in places still under Confederate control. As a result, in the westernmost Confederate state of Texas, enslaved people would not be free until much later. Freedom finally came on June 19, 1865, when some 2,000 Union troops arrived in Galveston Bay, Texas. *Continued on Page 2*

The army announced that the more than 250,000 enslaved black people in the state were free by executive decree. This day came to be known as "Juneteenth" by the newly freed people in Texas.

The post-emancipation period known as Reconstruction (1865-1877) marked an era of great hope, uncertainty and struggle for the nation as a whole. Formerly enslaved people immediately sought to reunify families, establish schools, run for political office, push radical legislation and even sue slaveholders for compensation. Given the 200+ years of enslavement, such changes were nothing short of amazing. Not even a generation out of slavery, African Americans were inspired and empowered to transform their lives and their country. As such, the historical legacy of Juneteenth shows the value of never giving up hope in uncertain times.

We will celebrate this wonderful occasion together with an exciting day of music and fellowship from 10 am to 4 pm.



Our three workshops will include a masterclass highlighting AGO certification skills (transposition, figured bass, harmonization, etc.), a reading session exploring hymns and anthems featuring social justice themes, and a lecture on the organ music of black women composers. Our very own Marvin Mills (left) will conclude the day with a concert at 3 pm on the beautiful Lively-Fulcher organ featuring

music by David Hurd, Marcel Dupre, Florence Price and more.

I played a Rodgers 840 organ for a church Christmas concert. I had to wear an elaborate choir robe that was much too large. I wore jeans and hiked the robe up to see the pedals.

SAINT DOMINIC CATHOLIC CHURCH WASHINGTON, DC

"The Island", as it was often called in the nineteenth century, consisted of the area now known as Southwest Washington. Members of the Order of Preachers – the Dominicans – have stood witness in this historic part of the District of Columbia for over 160 years. The present structure, designed by noted New York City-based architect Patrick Keely, was completed in 1875. Just a decade later, in 1885, a fire destroyed the church's interior, which was quickly restored. At the same time, the church was adorned with a grand new organ.



We at Di Gennaro-Hart are pleased to announce that we have been commissioned by the Archdiocese of Washington to undertake a major restoration of the Hilborne L. Roosevelt instrument. Cousins to Teddy, Hilborne and his

brother, Frank Roosevelt, were among the very finest nineteenth century American organ builders.


The project will include the replacement of the 1929 Englishstyle console with an "American terraced" console built according to current AGO standards. The console will offer a strong nod to the Roosevelts, particularly through the use of the engraving font that was commissioned by their firm. The present solid state control systems will be replaced with a 100 channel capture system and a new switching system with performance recorder. The reeds will be restored, numerous repairs will be completed, and the entire instrument will be thoroughly cleaned. A powerful Tuba stop, constructed by a shop that traces its roots to the Roosevelt firm, will be added.
