#### Lowenberg Receives Commission

Ken Lowenberg, long-time AGO member and officer, Minister of Music Emeritus at Chevy Chase Presbyterian Church, and current Organist at National City Christian Church, was commissioned by Hughes United Methodist Church on Georgia Avenue in Wheaton, MD to compose an original piece for organ and brass quartet to celebrate the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of their organist, Dr. Van Knauss, in his position as Organist at the church.

The celebration took place on Sun., May 28, beginning with the church's 10:30 a.m. service, during which Dr. Knauss was recognized and the commissioned piece by Lowenberg received its world premiere. The celebration continued with a gala reception in the church's social hall, following the service.

The composition, titled Sonata on "Lauda Anima," is in 3 movements (fast – slow – fast) for brass quartet and organ, and may be performed either as one continuous 10-minute piece (for concert use or as an extended Prelude) or broken up into 3 separate pieces (to be used for Prelude, Offertory or Communion, and Postlude, for liturgical practicality). All movements are based upon material from the hymn tune, *Lauda Anima*, or "Praise, My Soul, the King [God] of Heaven."

Lowenberg has two additional commissions coming up, one for SAB choir with piano and flute accompaniment, and one for SATB choir with organ accompaniment, to celebrate upcoming milestones of several churches.

The *Potomac Organ Institute* was founded in 1988 to interest pianists in the field of church music by providing instruction on the pipe organ. Auditions for prospective students are held annually and successful applicants receive one year of free organ instruction from a volunteer Tri-Chapter Guild member with lessons from September through May. Students participate in a master class, a spring recital, become members of their local AGO chapter, and receive a complimentary subscription to The American Organist magazine.

I am writing to ask you to identify a student or students – grades 7 and up, as well as adults – who have a good piano background, are interested in learning to play the organ, and who would benefit from a year of organ instruction.

Auditions will be held on Friday evening, June 23, and again on Saturday morning, June 24, at St. Columba's Episcopal Church, 4201 Albemarle Street, NW, Washington, DC. 

Wanted: Organists visiting Maui. Lahaina's Holy Innocents Episcopal Church invites visiting organists to play its Beckerath Positiv organ at Sunday services. Built in 1972 by Rudolf von Beckerath and then-apprentice Hans-Ulrich Erbslöh for Honolulu's Lutheran Church, the 408-pipe Shrankpositiv has a 54-note "split" manual, 30-note pedal, 11 stops, 8 ranks, and 6 registers.



Holy Innocents acquired the instrument in 1977 and moved it to Maui where it has been played by parish musicians such as Carol Monaghan and visiting artists including Angus Sinclair of Canada and Dalibor Miklavcic of Slovenia. The instrument is extremely responsive and fills the worship space beautifully.

The parish community is "exemplary in its hospitality to all visitors," and that especially includes visiting organists.

# Music @ the Monastery

Located on forty-four acres of beautifully landscaped gardens, the Franciscan Monastery (Mount St. Sepulchre Franciscan Monastery) is a beautiful architectural gem hidden in the northeast corner of Washington, D.C. Built in 1899 in the shape of a Jerusalem Cross in neo-Byzantine architectural style, the Monastery includes gardens, replicas of various shrines throughout Israel, a replica of the catacombs in Rome, an archive, a library, as well as bones of Saint Benignus of Armagh, brought from the Roman Catacombs and originally in the Cathedral of Narni, Italy. The Monastery's Lively-Fulcher pipe organ was built in 1998 and contains forty ranks of pipes over three manuals and pedal.

Together with the Franciscan Monastery, the DC AGO is proud to support a series of community outreach musical events titled, "Music @ the Monastery". These events are free of charge and take place on the second Sunday of each month at 4pm, followed by a reception. All are welcome!
