
THE COUPLER

On Monday February 19th our chapter presented its second annual Presidents' Day Organ Festival. It was a wonderful day of programming that included opportunities to learn, listen, play and socialize. The festival, graciously hosted by St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Washington, D.C., featured three presenters: Jeffrey D. Dexter, Rev. Benjamin Straley and Janet Yieh.

Jeffrey Dexter is vice-president and Tonal Director of the Schantz Organ Company in Orrville, Ohio. A native of Fort Atkinson, Wisconsin, he oversees the work of the tonal department along with sales and marketing for the Schantz Organ Company. He has served the Schantz company since 1993. Mr. Dexter's presentation focused on the organ reform movement in the United States.

The Rev. Benjamin Straley is Organist and Associate Director of Music at Washington National Cathedral. Prior to this appointment, he was Organ Scholar at Trinity Church (Episcopal), New Haven, as well as Director of Music for the Episcopal Church at Yale. Fr. Straley's presentation focused on hymn and service playing. This workshop was filled with interesting, practical and accessible tips to overhaul one's hymn playing, service playing and worship service appropriate improvisations. During this workshop members were encouraged to come forward and play the organ.

Lowenberg Composes Several Commissioned Works

Recently, long-time AGO member Ken Lowenberg has received several commissions to compose music for special commemorative occasions at various churches.

On May 28, 2017, "Sonata on Lauda Anima," for brass quartet and organ, received its world premiere at Hughes United Methodist Church, Silver Spring, MD. It was commissioned by the church to celebrate the 50th anniversary of Dr. Van Knauss as Organist there. Ken was also asked to play the organ at the morning service and rehearse with the brass, so that it would be a surprise for Dr. Knauss, and so that he could sit with his family in the congregation to enjoy the celebratory part of the service. The work is a three movement work (fast-slow-fast) all based on motifs from the hymn tune *Lauda Anima* ("Praise My Soul, the King [God] of Heaven"), and the three movements may be performed as one major piece or (as was done in the service) done as three separate pieces in various parts of the service, as Prelude, Offertory, and Postlude.

To celebrate the 100th anniversary of Cleveland Park UCC in Washington, DC, Dorothy Mora and Georgiana Dunham commissioned Ken to compose an anthem for SATB choir, piano, and flute. The result is "God of Our Past, Present, and Future," incorporating parts of *St. Anne* ("O God, Our Help in Ages Past") and *Sandon* ("God of Our Life"). It will be premiered at a festive service on Sunday, March 11.

Emmanuel Episcopal Church in Bel Air, MD, Brent Pertusio, Organist, commissioned Ken to compose an anthem for SAB choir and organ based on the text, "I Was Glad When They Said Unto Me" to celebrate the church's 150th anniversary. In addition to the text from Ps. 122:1 & 7, the anthem also uses text from Gen. 28:16b-17 (Surely the Lord is in this place....this is none other than the house of God.), creating an ABA form. It will receive its premiere performance at the Festival Service on Sunday, March 18, 2018.

Ken is working on a fourth commission, but it is to be a surprise for the personnel involved, so we will have to wait for a more full report until after the event has taken place!

Longwood Gardens Saturday, April 7 7:30 am to 7:30 pm



We will travel together by bus to Longwood Gardens in Kennett Square, PA! We will hear and play The Longwood Organ, which has the distinction of being the largest residential Aeolian ever constructed and is a stunning specimen of American Art Deco organ design and engineering. Newly restored in 2011, the organ captures an orchestral sound like no other. Hear it played by the most talented organists of today in our Ballroom. We will also hear The Longwood Carillon of 62 cast bells.

Our bus is scheduled to depart at **7:30 on Saturday morning** from the parking lot of Bradley Hills Presbyterian Church, 6601 Bradley Blvd. in Bethesda, MD 20817. You may leave your car parked during the day at Bradley Hills Presby. We will return by 7:30 pm.

John Widman will play the Longwood Carillon when we arrive; people can listen and walk around the gardens. Organist **Rudy Lucente** will demonstrate the Longwood Organ in the Ballroom from 12:30-12:50. **We will also have time reserved at the organ until 2:30 for all who wish to play the organ!**

Following the Longwood activities we will stop at a winery in Havre de Grace, MD on the way back home.








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Music @ the Monastery

Located on 42 acres, the Franciscan Monastery of the Holy Land is a beautiful architectural gem hidden in the northeast corner of Washington, D.C. Dedicated in 1898, the church is in the shape of a Jerusalem Cross in neo-Byzantine architectural style. The church and extensive contemplative gardens include full-size replicas of shrines from the Holy Land (the Franciscans have ministered there for 800 years), plus catacombs and a Lourdes Grotto. The monastery also has two hermitages for personal retreats. The Monastery's Lively-Fulcher pipe organ was built in 1998 and contains forty ranks of pipes over three manuals and pedal.

Together with the Franciscan Monastery, the DC AGO is proud to support a series of community outreach musical events titled, "Music @ the Monastery". These events are free of charge and take place on the second Sunday of each month at 4pm, followed by a reception. All are welcome!
