

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

Concerts to feature Well-tempered Clavier in Baroque temperament

Initial concert Sunday, March 20 at 4 pm Georgetown Lutheran Church, 1556 Wisconsin Ave. NW (free street parking on Sundays)

Local organist Stephen Ackert is planning a series of concerts that offer the chance to hear Bach's Well-tempered Clavier in its 300th birthday year as the composer himself might have heard it. The

concerts will feature the historically tempered Richard Howell organ at Georgetown Lutheran Church.

According to Ackert: "When I shared with colleagues my plan to put together a series of concerts around Bach's Well-tempered Clavier at Georgetown Lutheran Church, they questioned my choice of venue. After all, the Howell organ is very small – only 11 stops, and nine of them are on one manual. What's more, it's tuned to an 18th-century temperament. 'How will you manage repertoire that includes pieces in keys with five, six, or even seven flats or sharps?' they



asked. 'Washington has many organs with more plentiful stoplists and equal-tempered tuning. Wouldn't one of these be a better choice?'

"My answer is that the Howell organ presents contrapuntal music with remarkable clarity, and its limitations are not limitations at all when transcribing works that Bach conceived for the clavichord or the harpsichord.

"Moreover, Bach, when using the term `well-tempered,' was not referring to equal temperament, but to one of the several methods of tuning that were relatively new at his time. Those Baroque temperaments retained the sweetness of near-natural tuning in keys with three or fewer sharps or flats, while compromising keys like D-flat major or F-sharp major just enough that their out-of-tuneness would be noticeable only to the trained ear.

"Since the textures in the WTC are mostly contrapuntal, the anomalies of the tuning are less noticeable than they would be in hymns, for example. What all of the listeners will hear, and hopefully enjoy, is changes in character and color as the program moves through various keys."

The March 20 program will include the preludes and fugues in B-flat major, B-flat minor and G minor from the WTC Book I and the Prelude and Fugue in B-flat major from Book II, as well as William Boyce's Symphony No.1 in B-flat major.


MEMBER SPOTLIGHT

What got you interested in the organ?

I grew up in the small town of Hollidaysburg, PA, right outside the city of Altoona. I would try to convince my parents to attend Mass at the Cathedral of the Blessed Sacrament whenever I could. My home parish didn't have an organ until about 2011 when a three-manual Allen was installed, while



My uncle, Robert Long, is an organist/choral conductor who used to be music director at the Cathedral in Altoona and St. Patrick's Cathedral in New York City. He and Diane Bish, who filmed one of her episodes of "The Joy of Music" on the Steinmeyer, were my two earliest influences. I think it is safe to say my parents and I have that episode engraved in our minds from my endless playing of that VHS tape.

What is your educational/professional background?

After playing piano for roughly 12 years and cello and alto saxophone in middle and high school, I began organ lessons in the summer of 2019 after my senior year of high school. I have accompanied on piano my home church congregation, church choir, middle and high school choirs, high school orchestra and jazz band, and Academy of Sacred Music over the span of seven years.

I am a junior at the Catholic University of America pursuing a bachelor of music degree in organ performance. I primarily study with Benjamin LaPrairie with a focus on repertoire, technique, accompaniment and organ fundamentals. I am also studying with Ronald Stolk with a focus on improvisation, figured bass, hymn transposition and sight reading. Additionally, I am taking conducting lessons with Maestro Murry Sidlin.

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I am organist at St. Dominic Church in Southwest D.C. where I have been helping Michael Hart with the renovation of the 1885 H.L. Roosevelt pipe organ. I have also worked with Michael around the DMV area on other tuning and restoration projects. I aid Campus Ministry at CUA by accompanying the 4 pm Sunday Mass in the Crypt Church of the Basilica of the National Shrine.

What are your biggest challenges and joys in playing?

The biggest challenges I face are building up my body of repertoire and learning to work around/with a perfectionist mind-set. I thoroughly enjoy the technicality and thematic material in Bach, the emotional and expressive French Romantic works, and the exploratory modern pieces that represent the colors of the organ in the most vibrant way.

Regarding the instrument itself, I enjoy the variety and uniqueness of each instrument. Each organ has great qualities and possibly some flaws which make them individually special and relatable. Also, the dynamic and tonal range mixed with the endless combinations create a joyous experience that is anything but complacent.

Why are you in the AGO?

I wanted to join an organization of people who are just as passionate about the organ as I am. A small town in the middle of rural PA doesn't necessarily foster the type of musical community a metropolis like DC does. This excites me with the number of potential colleagues to meet and collaborate with. I look forward to making new and exciting connections with fellow organists and those who associate themselves in any way with the instrument in this organization. I hope to become more active as opportunities allow.

What do you like to do when you are not on the bench?

What do you mean?! I never leave it! (I wish that had more truth to it.) I enjoy cycling, kayaking, photography, traveling to new destinations, experiencing new instruments, going to performing arts concerts and spending time with family and friends.



SAINT DOMINIC CATHOLIC CHURCH WASHINGTON, DC

"The Island", as it was often called in the nineteenth century, consisted of the area now known as Southwest Washington. Members of the Order of Preachers — the Dominicans — have stood witness in this historic part of the District of Columbia for over 160 years. The present structure, designed by noted New York City-based architect Patrick Keely, was completed in 1875. Just a decade later, in 1885, a fire destroyed the church's interior, which was quickly restored. At the same time, the church was adorned with a grand new organ.



We at Di Gennaro-Hart are pleased to announce that we have been commissioned by the Archdiocese of Washington to undertake a major restoration of the Hilborne L. Roosevelt instrument. Cousins to Teddy, Hilborne and his

brother, Frank Roosevelt, were among the very finest nineteenth century American organ builders.

The project will include the replacement of the 1929 English-style console with an "American terraced" console built according to current AGO standards. The console will offer a strong nod to the Roosevelts, particularly through the use of the engraving font that was commissioned by their firm. The present solid state control systems will be replaced with a 100 channel capture system and a new switching system with performance recorder. The reeds will be restored, numerous repairs will be completed, and the entire instrument will be thoroughly cleaned. A powerful Tuba stop, constructed by a shop that traces its roots to the Roosevelt firm, will be added.
