The next DC AGO Chapter event will take place on Monday, April 27, at 7:30 p.m. Olivier Latry, Organist at Notre Dame de Paris, will offer a masterclass to DC AGO Chapter members. A reception will follow. Three players have been selected to perform in the masterclass:

Coming in May: A DC AGO First!

Plan on joining us for our May event, the firstever DC AGO Chapter Young Organists' Competition! Held in conjunction with our friends at the Franciscan Monastery, this event will take place on **Sunday, May 17**, at 4:00 p.m., at the Franciscan Monastery of the Holy Land, located at 14th and Quincy Streets, NE, in the Brookland neighborhood of Washington, DC.

Three finalists have been selected from the preliminary round that was held earlier this year. They are **Nicholas Capozzoli**, an organ student at Oberlin Conservatory; **Alden Wright**, a high school student from New Jersey; and **Janet Yieh**, an organ student at the Juilliard School of Music and Assistant Organist at Trinity Church, Wall Street. The three finalists are competing for cash prizes of \$1,500 (underwritten by Potomac Organ Institute), \$1,000 (underwritten by Montage Construction), and \$500 (underwritten by JAV Recordings).

The judges for this final round include **Peter Conte**, Grand Court Organist for the Wanamaker Organ; **Donald Sutherland**, Chair of the Organ Department at Peabody Conservatory; and **Andrew Weaver**, Professor of Musicology at the Catholic University of America.


Please come and cheer on these three talented young organists and hear them play some fantastic music in the aweinspiring monastery church. A festive reception will follow the competition.



The congregations of these two faith traditions often face challenges of replacing a retiring generation of musicians with young organists and music ministers adequately equipped to provide musical leadership. While standard organ training and repertoire will be covered and the expected required events of a POE will be

The church pianist plays music for our Sunday morning worship service(s) (hymns, incidental music, preludes, postludes, etc.) and is the choir accompanist.
